# Academic Enrichment Program—MOC AMC 8 Contest

Academic Enrichment Team is delighted to share that the Mock AMC 8 competition that was held on Tuesday, July 22, 2025 was a resounding success. All thanks to the enthusiastic participation from students, the unwavering support from our dedicated volunteers and the generous cooperation of the Bharatiya Temple administration.

We extend our heartfelt congratulations to all winners and participants alike. The spirit and success of the event was shaped by all who participated and helped organize it. Each of you contributed to the vibrant spirit of the event and we hope this experience was as rewarding for you as it was for us.

#### **Mock AMC 8 Participation Snapshot**

This year's **Mock AMC 8 math competition featured 25 questions** aimed at engaging and challenging students across various grade levels. We were thrilled to **welcome 47 participants**, with representation spanning **grades from 4 through 8**.

#### **Participation Breakdown**

• Grade 4: 6 students

Grade 5: 19 students

• Grade 6: 7 students

Grade 7: 14 students

Grade 8: 1 student

**Notably, 27 of these participants are currently enrolled in our program.** Details regarding top performers and recognition across each grade category were shared to honor their achievement and encourage continued learning.

### **Top Performers**

- The highest score achieved was an impressive 23 out of 25.
- Remarkably, the **top three scorers** in the entire competition are all students from our program, highlighting the impact and effectiveness of our approach.

#### **Honor Roll Awards**

The **Honor Roll** is awarded to students who earn a score of **19 or higher**.

- A total of **7 students** earned Honor Roll distinction.
- Of these, **4 students are currently enrolled in our program**, acknowledging their growth and impact in a competitive landscape.

#### **Achievement Awards**

The **Achievement Award** recognizes younger students, specifically those in **grade 6 or below** and who scored **15 or higher** and are **not** already included in the Honor Roll category.

- 7 students received Achievement Awards this year.
- Impressively, all 7 recipients are enrolled in our program, underscoring the outstanding mathematical capabilities of our youngest learners.

We plan to continue organizing similar competitions and actively encourage greater participation, both within our program and across broader communities.

#### **April 2025**

#### Chaitra-Vaishakh

The month of April, also known as Chaitra–Vaishakh in the Hindu calendar, marks the beginning of the Hindu New Year. It is considered an auspicious time for spiritual cleansing and acts of charity.

The month began with Chaitra Navaratri. Devotees participated in daily Chandi Path and Durga Puja rituals, led by priests, culminating on the eighth day (Ashtami) with a havan performed in tents set up in the temple premises. This event was attended by a large number of devotees.

On the ninth day, Ram Navami was celebrated with the Sita-Rama Kalyanotsavam, a reenactment of the celestial wedding of Sita Mata and Shri Rama. The priests performed the sacred ceremony with great pomp and devotion.

#### **Sunderkand Parayan**

The Sunderkand, the fifth chapter of the Ramayana, glorifies Lord Shri Ram and is recited by devotees on the first Sunday of every month. If the first Sunday coincides with a major festival, the event is rescheduled. Devotees of Lord Hanuman gather to chant together, creating uplifting and powerful spiritual vibrations.

#### Hanuman Jayanti

Six days after Ram Navami, Hanuman Jayanti is celebrated on Poornima. The event includes chanting of the Hanuman Chalisa five times, followed by bhajans and keertanams. It continues to draw a large number of attendees each year.

#### Vishu Celebrations

Vishu, the Zodiac New Year, is an appropriate time to offer oblations to Lord Vishnu. A special traditional setup is created in the temple, following Kerala customs, where prayers are offered to Lord Vishnu in the form of Krishna. The celebration concludes with the distribution of traditional food (prasad).

#### **Akhand Ramayan Parayan**

Every April, Akhand Ramayan Parayan is organized — a 24-hour nonstop chanting of Chaupais from the Ramayan, accompanied by the rhythmic beats of the dholak and manjira. For the past two years, this has been enhanced with three major Utsavs celebrating:

- Ram Janam (Birth of Lord Rama)
- Sita Mata-Shri Rama Vivah (Divine Marriage)
- Ram Rajyabhishek (Coronation of Lord Rama)

These events are filled with devotional singing and rituals performed by priests, creating a spiritually vibrant atmosphere — truly not to be missed.

### **New Monthly Observance**

A new monthly event has also been introduced: Yamunashtak Path and Bhajans are now held on every Shukla Paksha Ekadashi.

### **Other Regular Pujas**

In accordance with the religious calendar, the temple continues to hold:

- Sankashti Puja
- Murugan Puja
- Ayyappa Puja

along with other daily, weekly, and monthly pujas.

### May 2025

The temple functions performed during the month of May are outlined below. The Hindu months of Vaishaka and Jyestha spanned the month of May, from Shukla Panchami in Vaishaka to Shukla Shashti in Jyestha.

- Navagraha Puja: This important puja was performed on Saturday, May 3rd. The
  Navagraha Puja is dedicated to the nine celestial bodies that influence human life,
  and participating in it is believed to bring balance and remove obstacles.
- Navagraha Abhishekam: The special monthly Navagraha Abhishekam took place on Saturday, May 17th. This ritual involves bathing the idols of the nine planets with sacred substances, seeking their benevolent influence and mitigating any

negative effects.

- Murugan Puja: The Murugan Puja was performed on Saturday, May 3rd in the evening. This puja honors Lord Murugan, the son of Lord Shiva, and is an opportunity to seek his blessings for courage, wisdom, and success. Devotees sang bhajans in praise of Lord Murugan as the priests performed the puja.
- Sunderkand Parayan: The Sunderkand Parayan was held on Sunday, May 4th.
   This recitation from the Ramayana is believed to bring peace and prosperity. BTI devotees recited the Sunderkand accompanied by musical instruments.
- Yamunashtak Path: The Yamunashtak Path was recited on Ekadasi Wednesday,
  May 7th. This sacred path is dedicated to the Yamuna River, a holy river in
  Hinduism, and its recitation is believed to bring spiritual purification and
  blessings. The Yamunashtak Path is performed on Ekadasi, particularly within the
  Pushtimarg tradition, when ardent devotees fast and perform spiritual practices.
- Pradosham Siva Abhishekam: In the month of May Pradosham fell on Friday,
  May 9th and again on Saturday, May 24th. Pradosham which falls on Trayodasi in
  Shukla paksha and Krishna paksha of the lunar cycle, is an auspicious time to
  worship Lord Shiva and seek his blessings.
- Ayyappa Puja: Ayyappa Puja was celebrated on Saturday, May 10th. This puja is
  dedicated to Lord Ayyappan and is an opportunity to seek his divine grace.
  Devotees sang sweet bhajans in praise of Lord Ayyappan and participated in the
  puja.
- Satyanarayan Puja: In BTI we celebrated Satyanarayan Puja on Poornima, Sunday,
  May 11th in the evening. The puja is performed to Lord Vishnu in his
  manifestation as Lord Satyanarayan, the embodiment of truth. It is widely
  performed to seek blessings for prosperity, happiness, and fulfillment of desires.
- Sankashti: Sankashti was observed on Krishna paksha Chaturthi, Thursday, May 15th. Ganesh abhishekam was performed by the priests as the devotees chanted the Ganapati Atharvashirsha, shlokas, and bhajans. This day is dedicated to Lord Ganesh, and observing Sankashti is believed to help overcome obstacles and bring good fortune.

The Varshik Brahmotsav (Temple Anniversary) was celebrated from May 30th through June 1st in the temple.

- Friday, May 30th: The celebrations began on Friday morning with the Pradhan Kalash Sthapan & Sarva Devata Avahan Puja. In the evening, the priests and devotees performed the Kalash & Devata Avahan Puja, followed by Bhajans & Stotra Path by children. The Shodasopchar Puja of the Pradhan Kalash was performed.
- Saturday, May 31st: Saturday morning celebrations commenced with the Vishnu Parivar Mahabhishekam with Suprabhatam and Panchanadya Panchamrit Kalash Puja. This was followed by Mahabhishekam for Lakshmi Narayan, Radha Krishna, Ram Parivar, Satyanarayan & Venkateswara Parivar, and Venkateswara Utsav Murti Abhishekam. In the evening, the Siva Parivar Mahabhishekam was performed, including Panchanadya Panchamrit Kalash Puja and Mahabhishekam for Siva Parivar, Murugan, & Ayyappa.
- Sunday, June 1st: The final day, Sunday, began with the Ganesh, Durga, Hanuman & Navagraha Mahabhishekam in the morning, featuring Panchanadya Panchamrit Kalash Puja, and Ganesh Utsav Murti Abhishekam. As per tradition the Dhwaja puja by sponsors was conducted on the temple floor and then the priests hoisted the new Dhwaja atop the temple's main gopuram. The weekend anniversary celebrations concluded with Amritvani, followed by Bhajans by Swami Siddhanandaji's Group and the Sarva Devata Aarti.
- On all days and during each session, devotees sponsored Mahaprasad for all attendees. The anniversary celebrations were a great success and devotees are encouraged to attend the annual anniversary celebrations in large numbers.

#### June 2025

June 1st, temple opened at 8:30 AM in the morning. Sponsors and devotees attended the Panchanadyaa Panchamrit Kalash Puja with enthusiasm and devotion. Priests did the Mahabishek to Ganeshji, Durgama, Hanumanji and Navagrahas.

Dhwaja Puja was performed around 11 AM which symbolises the ashtamangala in Hinduism. It creates a protective shield around the temple and its followers. It represents the devotees dedication to follow the Sanathan Dharma. Dhwaja was taken around the

temple in a procession and replaced the old one with the new Dhwaja. Devotees were chanting mantras and Bhajans.

Around 11:30 we had bhajans and stotra path by our dedicated devotees. Maha arathi was performed followed by a delicious lunch prepared by Marathi Mandal. In the evening at 4:30 we had Amritvani and Bhajans which was well attended and Swami Siddhanandaji & his group sang devotional bhajans followed by Mahaprasad prepared by the Panjabi group.

Monthly Pujas and bhajans, Yamunastak kirtans were part of this month also.





















#### Celebrating Our Jain Heritage at Bharatiya Temple – June 7, 2025




